

Q83IL1 Intermediate Latin: 1

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This module continues the study of Latin from the level reached in Q81BL2 Beginners' Latin 2. It provides the opportunity to revise basic aspects of the Latin language and enables students to proceed to the reading of Latin texts. The text is Cicero's short speech *Pro Archia*, which can be completed in a single semester. The assessment-pattern emphasises comprehension over memorisation.
